Executive Summary

After reviewing the survey data and World Café responses, the needs assessment team identified the following priority areas.

Priority Areas

1. Childcare (Community and Agency Level):

- Finding infant care
- Finding additional childcare providers in the community
- Covering the costs of childcare
- Finding evening/night/weekend/ childcare

2. Transportation (Family and Agency Level):

- Lack of reliable transportation
- Lack of driver's license
- Lack of automobile insurance

3. Criminal Records (Family Level):

Helping people with criminal records find housing and jobs

4. Financial/Life Skills (Family Level):

 Money management skills, having a home bank, cooking meals, home maintenance/cleaning, soft skills to get and keep a job

5. Housing (Community Level):

Shortage of affordable housing

6. Senior Issues (Community Level):

Fast growing population in our service area & high level of poverty

Correlating Needs

Through review of surveys, world café's, and anecdotal data, **mental health** and **substance abuse** were found to be influential correlating needs to all of the priority needs listed above.

ICCC's Mission

ICCC's mission is to provide services, assistance and other activities of sufficient scope and magnitude to give promise of progress toward the alleviation of poverty, its symptoms and causes.

Overview

Background

Inter-County Community Council (ICCC) is a private non-profit organization incorporated in 1965. Currently, ICCC provides the following services: Employment & Training, Energy Assistance, Family Services, Food Support, Head Start, MNsure, and Weatherization.

Purpose

As an established Community Action Agency serving Northwest Minnesota, we are required to conduct a Community Needs Assessment every three years. The Community Needs Assessment is used to evaluate the needs of our service area and assist ICCC in planning for future services and programs based on the data collected. ICCC completed this by surveying clients, community members, and community partners where services are provided in Clearwater, East Polk, Pennington, and Red Lake counties. Surveys were also completed in neighboring counties that are served through Employment and Training programs.

Assessment Process

To collect quantitative data, two surveys were prepared by ICCC: a general survey and a community partner survey. During the month of April 2021, the general survey was distributed to ICCC's service area community members and program participants served in the last year and a half. The community partner survey was distributed in April/May of 2021 to ICCC partners who have a direct or indirect relationship with the low-income sector. Both surveys were made available on paper or online through an online survey tool and included questions in the following topic areas:

Mental Health Transportation
Housing Children & Youth

Financial/Legal Health

Seniors Connection & Strengths of the Community

Substance Use COVID -19

Poverty

To collect qualitative data, we hosted two "World Cafes" where participants were divided into small groups and rotated around the "World" giving us feedback on 6 topics. World Cafes were held with ICCC staff and Community Partners. The topics included: Employment and Training, Children/Youth, Housing, Financial/Legal, Health/Nutrition and Mental Health/Substance Use. We collected information on struggles and successes on each topic as well as what actions ICCC could do to support people in this area. ICCC Board of Directors and Head Start Policy Council were included in survey design, were invited to participate in the World Cafes, and reviewed and approved results of the Community Needs Assessment.

Means of Distribution

ICCC pulled a list of served households in the last year and a half. There were 1,709 households contacted via phone, email, mail and home visits. Postcards were printed and available at satellite offices, mailed to other community organizations, and handed out to households receiving services. ICCC also posted information about the need's assessment survey on the agency website and on all social media outlets.

Response Rate and Data Collection

General Survey: 256 responses

Community Partner Survey: 50 community partner surveys were completed.

Further county data was also collected through the American Community Survey (ACS) and other resources. *Anecdotal data for Polk County includes the entire county, unless otherwise noted. ICCC is the Community Action Agency designated to serve East Polk County, although we do have some programs that serve all of Polk County.



All of ICCC's County median household income is significantly lower than the state average median household income.

Education

Educational attainment is calculated for persons over the age of 25. All counties within ICCC service area, except for Pennington County, are above the state average of 6.86% with NO HS DIPLOMA. Our service area has a higher rate of persons over the age of 25 with No HS Diploma than compared to the state average. Similarly, ICCC service area falls below state average for those with Bachelor Degree's and Graduate/Professional Degrees.



Graduation Rates

According to MN Department of Education 2021 Report Card, Minnesota's Graduation rate is 83.8%. All schools in ICCC's service area, with the exception of Bagley, located in Clearwater County, are above the state average.

Poverty

Poverty Rates

In 2019 it was estimated that 4,212 (11.61%) households were living in poverty within our service area. Below shows the percentage of the population living with income below the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). All counties in our service area have a higher percentage of people living in poverty as compared to the state's data indicator.

According to the American Community Survey 5-year data, an average of 23.1% of children age 0-4 and 15.4% of children age 5-17 in ICCC's service area live in poverty. These rates exceed the poverty level in the state of MN.

Below are some additional facts and charts about poverty. In a family of one adult and two children, the family needs on average \$3,901 a month to meet basic needs for a safe standard of living. If the family receives all of the public supports they are eligible for in addition to working, they will still only have \$47 leftover to put toward savings, cellphones, internet, entertainment, and other miscellaneous expenses.

This graph is generated in ESI to show the family's pathway to economic stability. The entire time they are on MFIP, this family barely breaks even. As this family comes off MFIP at about 130% FPG (\$28,236 yearly or \$2,353 monthly), they experience their first cliff. Our scale is not sensitive enough to show all the ups and downs this family faces between 165% and 200% of FPG, but the family loses SNAP, School Meals, Early Learning Scholarships, MinnesotaCare, and most of their housing benefit. Even though the chart does not show it, the biggest cliff happens between 260% (\$56,472) and 275% (\$59,730) FPG, when the family becomes ineligible for Child Care Assistance, MA, and WIC.


Seniors in Poverty

Poverty rates for seniors (persons age 65 and older) living in ICCC's service area are shown below. According to the ACS survey, approximately 9.6% of seniors are living in poverty within ICCC's service area. This rate is higher than the Minnesota (7.2%) average.

Survey Respondent Results

Survey respondents (General and Community Partner) were asked what they felt was the main cause of poverty in their community. 83.34% of Community Partner respondents felt that Drug Abuse/Addiction was the main cause of poverty, while 81.32% of General Respondents felt that Lack of Affordable and/or Quality Housing was the main cause.



Qualitative data collected through World Café conversations with both Community Partners and ICCC staff also identified Substance Use/Addiction and Lack of Affordable and/or Quality Housing as barriers, but also found that our community struggles with the following: lack of financial planning skills, unaffordable childcare, lack of transportation and moving forward in life with a criminal record.

Employment & Education/Training

Employment


Labor force, employment, and unemployment data for ICCC's service area is shown below. Overall, ICCC's service area experienced an average of 6.33% unemployment rate in March 2021. This exceeds Minnesota's unemployment rate of 4.5%. According to Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development, in the fourth quarter of 2020, Northwest Minnesota had 11,255 total job vacancies.

Qualitative data from the World Café found that lack of childcare, transportation, and criminal record/background checks were large barriers to securing and maintaining adequate employment. In regards to education/training, World Café data indicated that households need assistance navigating a career path as well as understanding how to apply for scholarships, grant opportunities, and FAFSA. It was identified that many families struggle to secure adequate employment because some jobs require a diploma/degree before you are considered for employment. Other barriers to employment/training include: mental health, juggling work and school, literacy and language barriers, and soft skills.

Survey respondents (General and Community Partner) were asked what they believe were barriers to job satisfaction in their own life or in their communities. General Respondents AND Community Partners believe the greatest barrier to job satisfaction is that the health benefits are not affordable.



Housing

Housing Units


Each year, the US Census Bureau estimates the number of housing units within each county. A housing unit is a house, apartment, mobile home, or a group/single room that is occupied as separate living quarters. Cost-Burdened households are those who spent 30% or more of their monthly gross income on housing. ICCC's service area data on housing is shown. Clearwater County has the highest cost-burdened percentage coming in at 29%.

Housing Barriers

Survey Respondents (General and Community Partner) were asked what they believe were the barriers to housing. Each group indicated a different barrier they believed was the largest barrier. However, both groups had a large percentage of respondents agree that the physical condition of a home was a large barrier.




Qualitative data from the World Café found that there is a shortage of affordable and available housing that is in good condition. It was also found that housing assistance is difficult to secure due to long waiting lists and disqualifiers such as a criminal background or various rental assistance regulations. Other barriers to housing identified include: utility costs, upkeep and repair costs, and unresponsive or slow to act landlords.

Homelessness



Transportation

Methods of transportation were reported for ICCC's service area by the U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey 2015-2019. Data shows that approximately 79.25 % drove to work alone while 9.75% carpooled, 3.5% rode bicycle or walked, 1% used a taxi or other means, and 0.75% used public transportation.

Survey Respondents (General and Community Partner) were asked what they believe were barriers to transportation in their own life or in their communities. General Respondents AND Community Partners believe the greatest barrier to transportation is vehicle repairs costs. Further data is shown below.




Qualitative data from the World Café found that lack of affordable automobile insurance and public transportation cost were large barriers to transportation. Other barriers for transportation include: public transportation with children, lack of a vehicle, and walking or biking a long distance to one's destination.

Financial/Legal


Financial and Legal

The top three barriers were the same in both the General Respondents and Community Partner surveys. The main barrier identified was the amount of debt households had. The other two barriers identified were the ability to find legal assistance and student financial aid.



Qualitative data from the World Café highlighted that families could benefit from education on financial planning, life skills, home maintenance/ownership, assistance with revoked driver's license and getting/finding affordable automobile insurance. In addition, many families do not have a 'home bank' with accounts that will allow them to cash a check at no cost or put money into a savings account.






HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR CHILDREN BY TYPE, 2018

Child Care


In surveying local childcare centers, our service area has seen a reduction of 316 child slots in the last 3 years. Survey Respondents (General and Community Partner) were asked what they believe were barriers to finding child care in their own life or in their communities. Below you will find survey data that shows that the largest barrier to child care is lack of providers.



Qualitative data from the World Café highlighted families are struggling with a shortage of providers, lack of quality care, a waitlist for the Child Care Assistance Program, and the overall cost of care that families face.


Other Youth Concerns




Feeling of Belonging/Substance Use:

Survey respondents identified feeling of belonging and drug/alcohol use as areas of concern for our younger community members.



Qualitative data from the World Café highlighted that our children face mental health issues and a lack of available mental health services. They note that our communities have done better at offering positive activities for youth, but families may be struggling to cover the costs or transportation to and from these activities.



According to the 2020 MN Kids Count Data Book, student homelessness affects their ability to develop reading proficiency by 3rd grade, in comparison to their housed peers.



Of those who responded to our General and Community Partner survey's, 56.04% and 80.49% respectively, believe the greatest barrier for seniors is Understanding Health Insurance and Medicare Part D.

Health

Medically Underserved/Health Professional Shortage Area

According to the MN Office of Rural Health and Primary Care, ICCC lies within a geographic area that is designated as a low-income/geographic Health Professional Shortage Area for dental, mental health and primary care. According to the Federal Health Resources & Services Administration, the majority of our area is also in a Medically Underserved Area which means that the area has too few primary care providers, high infant mortality, high poverty, or a high elderly population. All 4 of our counties fall into the primary care medically underserved category. Pennington county was added to this designation on 5/24/2021.


Dental Access

As a part of a partner grant application, the following information was identified:

- All of MN counties fall in a Dental Health Professional Shortage area
- Our area falls into a high Medicaid enrollment area
- According to the MN Health Assessment of 2017 from MN Department of Health, rural and isolated areas of
 the state have only one practicing dentist for every 3,900 residents. This forces residents to face added
 travel time, appointment wait time, and dentists who do not accept patients covered by public programs.

Qualitative data from the World Café found that lack of Prescription Medications and Dental Coverage are large barriers in our community. Other barriers to health include: finding and paying for mental health services, obtaining birth control or family planning services, information on long-term care planning, and applying for affordable health insurance.



Most SNAP Participants in Minnesota Are Poor


Share of participants by household income, FY 2019

Mental Health

Adverse Childhood Experiences Study (ACES)

According to the Centers for Disease Control, Adverse Childhood Experiences Study states that ACES are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood (0-17 years) such as violence, abuse, or neglect; having family member attempt or die by suicide; substance abuse; mental health problems; instability due to parent separation or household member incarceration. These are linked to chronic health problems, mental illness, and substance abuse in adulthood. It can negatively impact education, job opportunities, and earning potential.


Prevalence + Frequency

Minnesota, 2019 MSS

According to the 2019 Minnesota Student Survey (MSS):

- Of Minnesota's 8th, 9th, and 11th graders, 48% reported experiencing at least one ACE.
- More than half of adolescents experiencing any ACEs report more than one.
- · The most frequently reported ACEs in Minnesota are:
 - living with someone with mental illness (26%)
 - parental incarceration (16%)
 - and household alcohol abuse (11%).
- · The least frequently reported are:
 - sexual abuse (6%)
 - and household drug use (5%).

Number of ACEs Reported




Of students with 0 ACEs, 6% reported having thoughts of suicide in the past year, compared to 45% of students with 4+ ACEs; students with 4+ ACEs are 7.5 times more likely to report suicidal thoughts.



Substance/Alcohol Use

Substance Use

In Minnesota, more than 2.5 million opioid prescriptions were reported as dispensed in 2019, a decrease of about 8.5% from 2018. Substance use in ICCC's service area includes both alcohol and drug use. ICCC staff identified many barriers to treatment for substance abuse and barriers to reintegrating into society after receiving treatment or serving time in jail or prison.

Barriers Identified:

- Lack of options for treatment in their community
- Lack of a support system near treatment centers or upon discharge
- Having to choose between work and treatment
- Childcare during treatment
- Duration of treatment
- Following treatment or incarceration for substance related crimes, people may face ineligibility for assistance, housing, and employment


Alcohol Use

In 2019, most Minnesotans (60.5%) said they drink alcohol, according to Minnesota Department of Health, Minnesota has one of the highest binge drinking rates in the nation at 20.7%. According to the 2021 County Health Rankings, an average of 23.75% of people in ICCC's service area reported excessive drinking.


From 2012 to 2019, the rate of neonatal abstinence syndrome (NAS) was highest in the Northwest Emergency Medical Services (EMS) region.



In our local surveys, the following were reported as hardships by the general public:


- Change or loss of work/job
- Illness and/or death due to COVID-19
- Loss of childcare
- Lack of socialization and support systems
- Managing distance learning with children
- Navigating online appointments
- Increased stress and anxiety

The following were reported as hardships clients faced, as reported by our community partners:

- Social isolation and/or impact on mental health due to social isolation
- Fear correlating with somewhat paranoid behaviors/statements
- Overwhelming care of their children while teaching school and working from home at the same time
- Lack of parental ability and/or desire to supervise and enforce distance learning attendance & participation
- General mental health concerns, fear/anxiety, depression
- Lack of access to mental health care in a timely manner
- Lack of "community" meals missing the socialization that comes with eating meals together
- Loss of work/income
- Worsened medical problems
- Stress about medical bills if they contract COVID-19 and are seriously ill


